Windsor Law is a transformative law school for the next generation of lawyers. For over 50 years, Windsor Law has advanced access to justice through various academic and experiential learning initiatives, including clinical and placement opportunities. We are a justice-seeking, community-engaged and people-centered law school. Windsor Law adheres to its core values, scaling up its role as a socially conscious legal institution. It embeds access to justice into every step of its programming.

Windsor Law reviews all applications for admission through a holistic lens and selects those students who will excel in the study of law and who have the potential to contribute creatively and meaningfully to the law school and the community.

Windsor Law fosters a sense of community and collegiality among its members and places a strong emphasis on student well-being. Professors are easily approachable, and the staff are dedicated to supporting to students. The law school encourages students to actively engage in all aspects of campus life, including our active student groups such as the Student Law Society, Black Law Student Association, Women and the Law, and approximately 50 other student clubs and associations.

Windsor Law is defining the next era of legal education, with its newly transformed building. We have undergone a multi-million-dollar renovation to our law building to enhance the student experience, connect with our indigenous community, and advance accessibility and support the environment for future years to come.

Windsor Law sits on the traditional territory of the Three Fires Confederacy, which is comprised of the Ojibway, the Odawa, and the Potawatomi. We are committed to ensuring Indigenous legal traditions and perspectives are fully acknowledged and respected in our teaching, research and community engagement.

MEET OUR DEAN, REEM BAHDI

Reem Bahdi was appointed the Dean of Windsor Law on July 1, 2021. She joined the faculty in 2002 where her teaching and research has focused on access to justice in both Canada and Palestine. In 2015 she was appointed a member of the Royal Society of Canada's College of New Scholars, Artists, and Scientists for national research excellence. As well, she is the recipient of the 2017 Guthrie Medal for her research, teaching and advocacy in furtherance of access to justice in Ontario. The Student Law Society at Windsor Law has bestowed the award for exemplary teaching and dedication to Windsor Law on her three times and the University of Windsor has recognized her research with five distinguished teaching awards.

Dean Bahdi was awarded the Hala Salam Maksoud Award at the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee National Convention. Her leadership was also recognized by The Canada Arab Business Council which presented her with its Outstanding Arab Canadian Achievement Award for contributions to the business and cultural fabric of Canada at its annual gala dinner, May 29, 2023.

Dean Bahdi co-created and co-Directed KARAMAH, The Project on Judicial

Independence and Human Dignity, a multi-million dollar initiative which aimed to support human dignity in Palestine through research, continuing judicial education and directed civil society engagement. She served as the Editor-in-Chief of the Windsor Yearbook of Access to Justice and the Associate Dean of Windsor Law between 2012 and 2015.

In August of 2023 Dean Bahdi was appointed to the Independent Advisory Board for Supreme Court of Canada Judicial Appointments and in March 2024, she was appointed to the Board of Governors of the International Association of Law Schools, a non-profit society dedicated to serving the worldwide legal education community.

Professor Bahdi was the first Palestinian Law Professor in Canadian history and the first Palestinian Law Dean in North America.

PROGRAMS

Study comparative Canada-US law to earn joint Canadian & American Dual Juris Doctor (JD) degrees that will allow you to practice law in both countries, or combine a Juris Doctor (JD) with a Master of Social Work (MSW) or Master of Business Administration (MBA) to open unique career opportunities and achieve two degrees in less time.

Juris Doctor (JD)

Our three-year Juris Doctor (JD) program provides the theoretical framework and experiential learning opportunities to effectively and successfully practice law in Canada. Students have the opportunity to customize their program to fit their individual interests.

Canadian & American Dual JD

The Canadian & American Dual JD Program offers a unique curriculum for students to earn a law degree in both Canada and the United States in just three years. This integrated program is a collaboration between Windsor Law and the University of Detroit Mercy School of Law.

Juris Doctor/Master of Social Work

The integrated JD/MSW program offers students an opportunity to earn both a law degree and a graduate degree through a condensed, four-year curriculum. This program promotes the integration of law and social work through an interdisciplinary commitment to social justice.

Juris Doctor/Master of Business Administration

The integrated JD/MBA program offers two powerful degrees through a condensed, four-year curriculum. This program promotes the integration of law and business through an interdisciplinary curriculum offered by Windsor Law and the Odette School of Business.

Master of Laws (LLM)

This graduate law program is geared towards lawyers looking to further specialize in almost any area of law. Students may choose from two streams: a one-year, research-based LLM degree or a two-year LLM degree with a certificate in University Teaching and Learning.

GENERAL PATHWAY

A minimum of 3 years of full-time (or equivalent) University study is preferred, while most successful applicants have completed a 4-year University undergraduate degree. Graduate degree holders are particularly welcome to apply.

INDIGENOUS PATHWAY

We recognize that Indigenous applicants are not adequately represented within the legal profession. Our admission policy encourages Indigenous applicants to pursue legal studies.

We encourage applicants to demonstrate connection to the community when completing the Personal Statement questions.

If you are an Indigenous applicant and receive an acceptance to the Faculty of Law, an Indigenous Pre-Law Summer Orientation Program is offered at Windsor Law in August.

Clinical Placements provide a unique opportunity to gain in-depth knowledge of social justice organizing, community engagement, and movement lawyering. Participants will explore how different areas of law contribute to legal marginalization, analyze policies, develop strategies for organizing, representing, and advocating for marginalized groups.

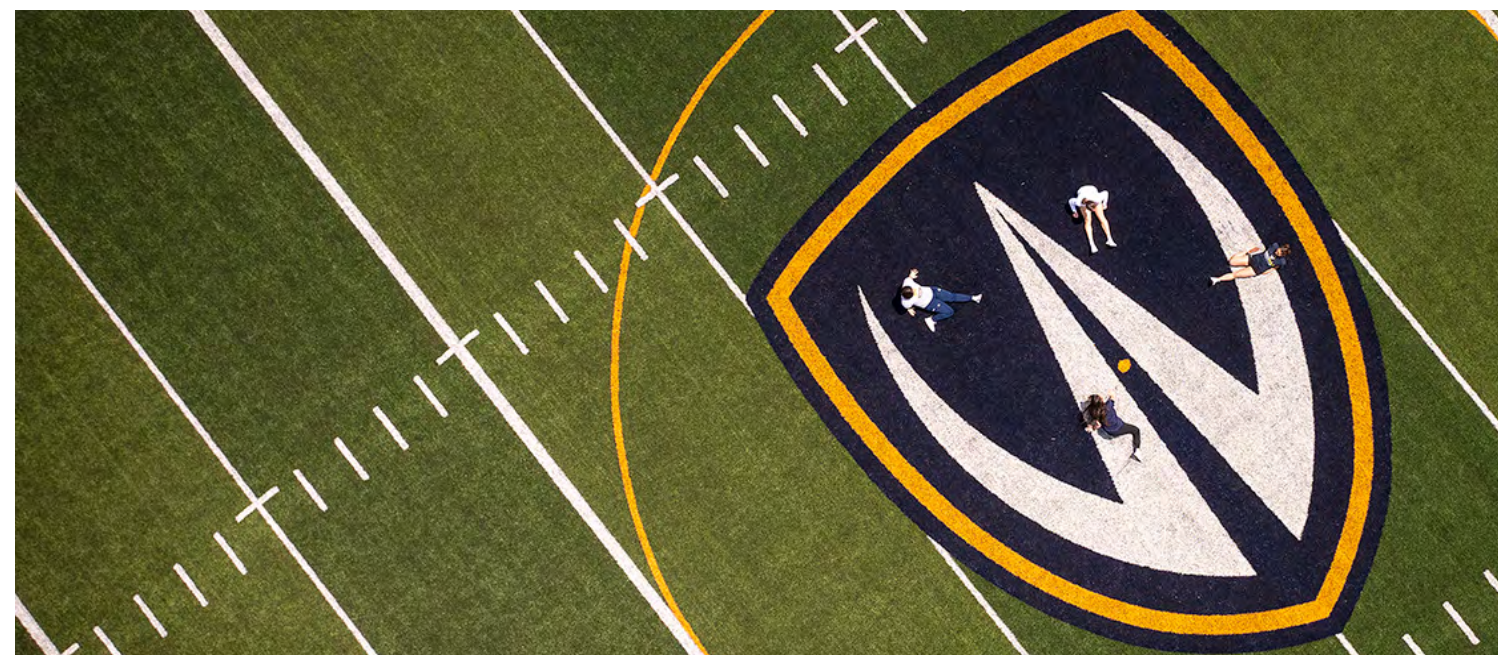
EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Windsor Law's Externship Program places students in law firms, non-profits, non-government organizations, courts, and community collectives under the supervision of a licensed lawyer. Students participate in a preparatory seminar and are provided both on-site and academic supervision throughout the term. The Externship Program incorporates work-integrated and skills-based learning alongside critical reflection, self-directed personal and career planning, focus on ethical and professional practice, and engagement with access to justice in theory and practice.

Windsor Law's Externship Program consists of two distinct but complementary portions: a seminar course titled "Learning in Place" and the placement itself entitled "Externship Placement". The seminar will consist of pre-placement training, ongoing support and a final placement showcase. The Externship Program includes a competitive application process, an array of placement sites, and a seminar that integrates the academic and work-based components of the program. Placements will vary from term to term. Students must enrol in both the seminar and work portions simultaneously.

Being situated next to North America’s busiest international border crossing, there is no better place to earn your JD, LLM or study Canadian, American and international law.

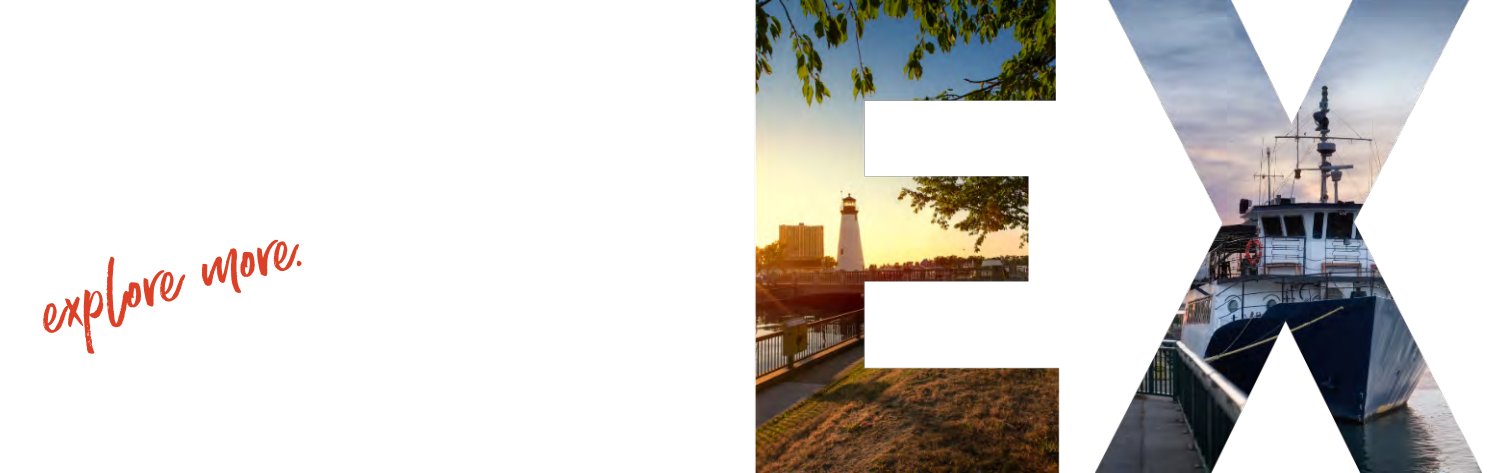
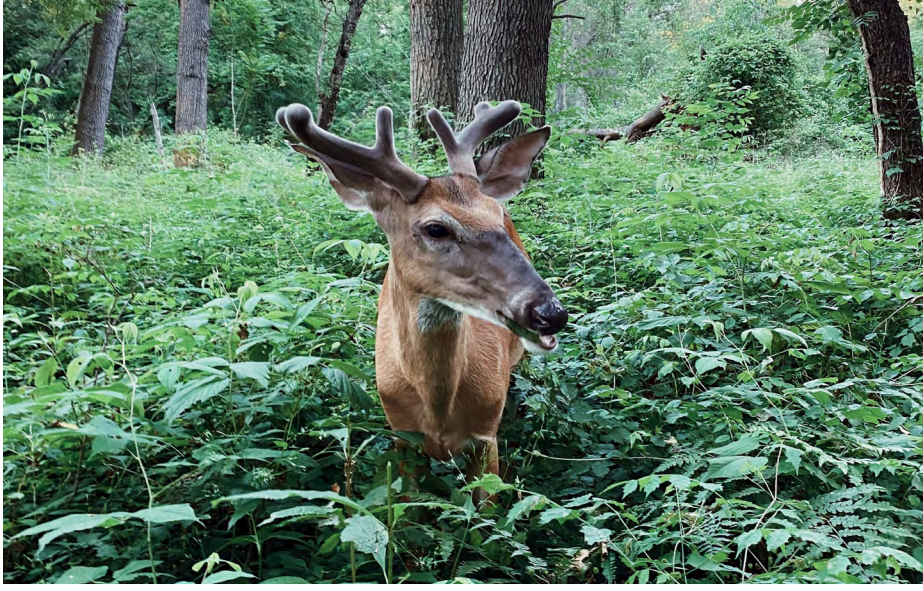

“Waawiiatanong Ziibi” is an Anishinaabemowin (Ojibwe) phrase. It translates to “Where the River Bends” in English. The phrase describes a specific location along a river, highlighting the natural bend or curve in the river’s path. The term is often associated with the Detroit River area, reflecting the Indigenous peoples’ connection to the land and waterways. Windsor Law, sits across from the Detroit River on the traditional territory of the Three Fires Confederacy, which is comprised of the Ojibway, the Odawa, and the Potawatomi. We are committed to fully acknowledging and respecting Indigenous legal orders in our teaching, research, and community engagement. Our Faculty of Law curriculum is rich with Indigenous-specific courses, including a mandatory first-year course on Indigenous Legal Orders and several upper-year options, such as Indigenous law camps. Additionally, we have established an Indigenous Legal Orders Institute and offer an elder-in-residence program.

WHERE THE RIVER BENDS

Launched in the fall of 2019, the **Indigenous Legal Orders Institute** aims to promote and assist Indigenous peoples with the revitalization and dissemination of their respective Indigenous legal orders through relationship building, collaboration and re-development using Indigenous and other research methods. Our objective is to use our institutional capacity and legal skills to provide research to further the needs of Indigenous communities locally, provincially, nationally and internationally to address the interruption and transmission of Indigenous knowledge by the impacts of colonization.

She assists students in recognizing and utilizing their resources, promoting greater self-compassion, self-awareness, and understanding of personal values to support their goal achievement. Lorraine embraces person-centred care, respecting individuals' unique identities and experiences. She conscientiously creates a safe and supportive atmosphere for all her students.



OUR ELDER IN RESIDENCE

Myrna Kicknosway is a Bodawatomi/Odawa Anishinaabe Kwe of the Loon Clan. She originates from the lands and waters that are part of Bkejwanong Territories and resides at Walpole Island, upstream from Detroit/Windsor on the St. Clair River. She is a mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother.

Her background and skills have led her to work professionally and voluntarily in the fields of education, counseling, economic/employment planning, federal corrections, environmental activism, and community development.

Her life journey, personal learning, and healing are providing her with an ever-expanding appreciation and gratefulness for who she is and the knowledge and wisdom of the ancestors who walked on this creation before her. Helping others is her life purpose, opening endless possibilities and opportunities for resilience, compassion, joy, and forgiveness.

She acknowledges all those men and women, many of whom have passed into that beautiful Spirit realm, who have helped her on her journey. This journey has led her toward the recognition of the interconnectedness of all humans, the significance of culture, language, traditions, and all those elements that help sustain life here, this place she calls her mother.



Windsor Law recognizes the importance of good mental health as imperative to the practice of ethical, justice-seeking lawyers. We believe that taking personal mental health and wellness seriously is of utmost importance for all law students. As such, the Faculty of Law is proud to provide services to enable students in building their resilience, healthy habits, and space to discuss personal challenges, and receive support when they need it.

As a Faculty, we are committed to inclusivity and accessible legal education. Improving wellness in the faculty, and providing a rich legal education are synchronized interests. Addressing mental health issues within our community makes happier and healthier individuals, but also better students and members of the legal profession.

Law school does not have to be synonymous with poor student and practitioner health - it is not a necessary by-product of a rigorous legal education. We encourage students to build resilience, social supports, and to reach out for help when needed; because no one can do it alone.

In addition to student support offered on campus, Windsor Law offers:

- Counselling Services: free and confidential sessions with an on-site clinical therapist.
- Elder in Residence Program: an on-site Elder who adopts the role of surrogate grandmother or grandfather.
- Mental Health and Wellness Initiative: a volunteer-based student group that hosts wellness events and initiatives.
- Therapy Assisted Online: an online self-help guide.
- Peer Mentorship Program: a program that pairs first-year law students with upper-year mentors.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS PROGRAM: Law students come from a variety of academic disciplines. The Academic Success Program assists first-year students in transitioning to law studies. Sessions address anything from learning strategies to case analysis, briefing, and prepping for exams. Tutorials provide further support for students beyond the classroom.

PEER MENTORSHIP PROGRAM: At Windsor Law, you will always have someone to turn to for advice and support. Upper-year students are matched with first-year students to help them transition to law school.

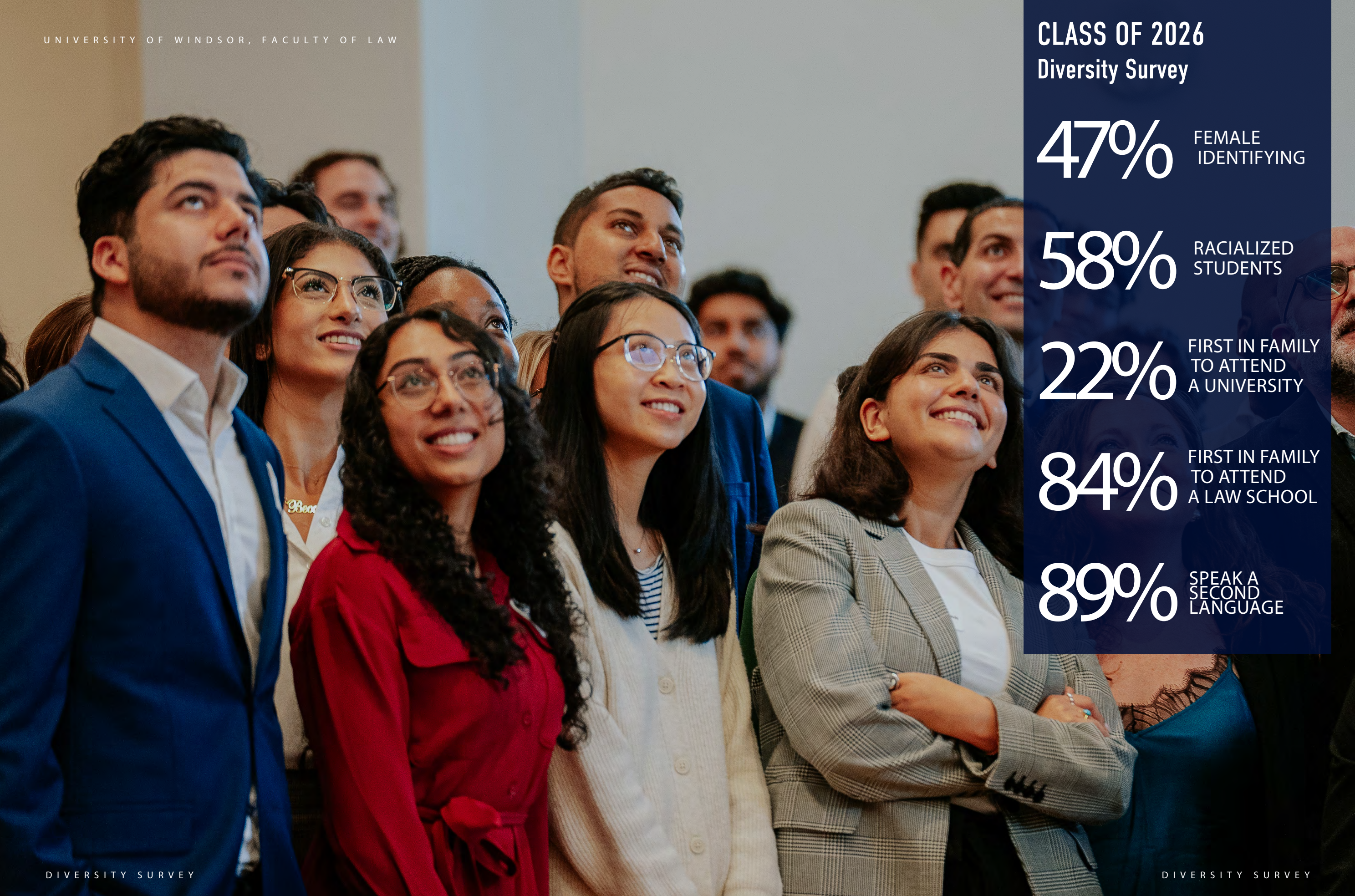
JOB SHADOWING PROGRAM: Shadow a private practice lawyer, a corporate Bay Street partner, a government lawyer, a politician, a leader in business or industry or a director of a NGO. Wherever you're going, we've got a mentor for you.

INDIGENOUS LEGAL STUDIES PROGRAM: In addition to our Indigenous Legal Orders course, Windsor Law offers hands-on, experiential learning of the same kind by taking students, faculty and staff to local First Nations communities. Teachings are conducted outdoors to demonstrate first-hand how Indigenous law is found in many different aspects of the living and natural world.

Windsor Law Professor Jasminka Kalajdzic was appointed a judge of the Superior Court of Justice of Ontario in Windsor.

"I loved the 15 years I spent at Windsor Law. It is an incredible place to work and grow as a legal scholar," Kalajdzic said. "I am honoured now to be a judge of the Superior Court of Justice in Windsor, and to continue serving the community I call home."

For the past 15 years, Justice Kalajdzic has been a trailblazer at Windsor Law. She was the first Windsor Law faculty member to be elected a bencher of the Law Society of Ontario in 2023. She also is the founding director of the country's first Class Action Clinic.

Kalajdzic joined the Faculty of Law in 2009 after 12 years in private practice as a civil litigator. Her classes in evidence, class actions, access to justice, and legal ethics have always had long waiting lists.

In 2021, she received the inaugural Excellence in Class Actions Award from the Ontario Bar Association, and the University of Windsor Alumni Association Award for Distinguished Contributions to University Teaching. In 2023, she was honoured by the bar association for her significant contributions to access to justice. She has published three books and dozens of peer-reviewed articles, book chapters, and reports on all aspects of class action litigation, among other topics.
