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COURSE DESIGN

Lectures will be posted as videos on Mondays and Wednesdays at 8:30 am, and there will be 4 short quizzes on Fridays (Sept 24, Oct 8, Nov 5, & Nov 12). Notes, as Powerpoint files, will also be posted to Blackboard ahead of time. Lectures will be officially asynchronous so you can watch whenever you choose. Labs will be hosted through Microsoft Teams on either Tuesdays or Thursdays at 2:30-5:20 pm (as per your schedules) starting September 14/16, 2021. Most lab sections will begin with a paper discussion on a paper given the week before and will be followed by an online lab exercise with "in-lab" assignments due to your GAs by the end of your lab section (5:20 pm). On September 21/23 there will be an in-class field trip, not virtual. If you are uncomfortable attending this trip due to COVID concerns please let your GA know ahead of time so an alternate lab assignment can be arranged for you. You do not need a medical note to miss the field trip, just notify your GA that you will not be attending. Your GAs and I will strive to keep this course engaging and interactive and would appreciate your patience as we all navigate these unprecedented times together.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

At the completion of the course, each student should be able to:

- Demonstrate familiarity with the evolution, ecology, and biology of fishes
- Define and correctly use terminology related to the anatomy of fishes and fish identification
- Distinguish numerous local species from each other, and be able to identify their key characteristics
- Identify the central importance of fish to the global ecosystem
- Read and discuss scientific papers in an intelligent fashion and understand the basics of scientific paper writing

TEXT/READINGS: There won't be a required textbook for this course but if you want a text, I recommend either The Diversity of Fishes by Helfman, Collette and Facey or Fishes: An Introduction to Ichthyology by Moyle & Cech. [If you don't want to buy them, check this website https://openlibrary.org/subjects/ichthyology]. I will assign supplemental readings throughout the semester. These may be scientific papers for discussion, or review papers for your information. You are responsible for the content in all additional readings identified as required. This is to help teach you how scientists get their information and how the information in textbooks comes into existence. I may also give you some optional information for those that are interested; I will be sure to clearly differentiate the required readings and the optional ones.

LAB READINGS: You are responsible for checking the website and downloading the lab exercises and papers for each week. This is to assure that you are prepared before lab starts. A few times during the semester you will have a pre-lab quiz that should be easy IF you have read the handout. Your GAs will be in charge of the quizzes.

PARTICIPATION: You will note above that some of your grade is for participation. All paper discussions and lab exercises require active participation and this will be considered when calculating your participation grade. As the class is online this year, participation will be largely judged by your **verbal** contributions to the lab based paper discussions.

LECTURE EXAMS AND MAKEUPS: The two lecture exams (one midterm exam and one final) will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions. Students missing exams for a legitimate reason will be offered a make-up exam but you must let Dr. Higgs know you will miss and use the "Report Illness" tab on UWinSite Student. Make-up exams will be given **within one week** of the scheduled exam date at a mutually convenient time. Students caught cheating on the exams will be referred to the Dean's office for disciplinary action.

REGRADES: Every attempt will be made to grade exams and assignments completely and fairly, however mistakes do occur. If you feel a mistake has occurred or you were graded unfairly you are encouraged to notify your professors. However, to avoid abusing the system some rules are needed. You have **one week after we return your exam or assignment** to apply for a regrade. No appeals will be considered after the one-week time limit. All requests for a regrade **must be in writing**. If you find a math error this also must be brought to our attention within the one-week time limit but does not require a written request.

The short version for your papers: if we find more than 5 words in your own work that are identical to another source and are without citation and quotation, you are plagiarising. "Plagiarism: the act of copying, reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material (from any source, including the internet), without proper acknowledgement. (Students have the responsibility to learn and use the conventions of documentation as accepted in their area of study.)"

"Submitting the same course work, research or assignment, or portions of the same course work, research or assignment, for credit on more than one occasion without the prior written permission of the instructor(s) in the course(s) involved. Taking part in unauthorized collaboration with another student which may include working in a group and submitting the same course work as one or more students, unless expressly permitted by the instructor."

"Copying or using unauthorized aids, or, without permission, working or receiving assistance from another, when writing tests or examinations (including take-home tests or examinations)."

"Allowing another student to copy one's academic work when one knows or has reason to believe the other student will be submitting the work for evaluation."
